AFT Presentation to the Board of Trustees on the CyFair Stabbings – May 2, 2013

I am John Burghduff representing the American Federation of Teachers.

At the February meeting of the Board, I spoke about a shooting at North Harris College. Three months later I am speaking to you about another act of violence, this time occurring partly right outside my own office suite. On April 9, a disturbed CyFair College student stabbed fourteen students in the Health Science Center including two that my colleagues and I sheltered in our office suite. I want you to know firsthand what happened that day.

We are greatly blessed that all of the victims of these brutal attacks are recovering. The primary reason for this positive outcome is the decisive action of many faculty, staff and students who rose to the occasion, sometimes at great personal risk. Some chased down and caught the perpetrator. Others tended to the victims some of whom were seriously wounded. Still others found ways to get the word to students and colleagues to lock down and shelter in place. Others communicated with police and emergency personnel to make sure they knew what had happened and where the victims were. Still others took on the gruesome task of cleaning up the scene so that students could return to classes the next day. Since the attacks, I have been trying to identify as many of those individuals as I could find to recognize them in our next edition of *The Advocate*. I have left for you a list of 43 courageous CyFair employees I have identified so far and the key roles they played.

Although I wish I could focus all of my time with you today on the heroes of April 9, I would not be giving you a complete view of what happened. There were serious flaws in the college's emergency response that created confusion and left students and employees in potential danger for too long.

Our internal 911 system overloaded and failed apparently only able to handle five or six incoming calls at a time. Our text messaging system worked for some employees and students but not others. There was a nearly 45 minute delay between the time of the first successful 911 call and the time the official lock down order came from college administration as has been reported on Channel 2 News. The police office was empty and locked. College administrators did not activate the public address system. Instead, the announcement that was featured on the news was made by a lab coordinator who figured out the system, a system that is still not fully functional and is accessible to only a few people. Because of these flaws, students and employees continued to wander into crime scenes unaware of what had happened and unsure of whether the violence had stopped.

Twice in one semester, the students and employees of LSCS have been victims of brutal violence. What concerns the AFT greatly is that many of the systems that did not work properly at North Harris in January were still not working properly at CyFair in April. My colleagues and I need to see that solving these problems will be the highest priority for the administration and the board.
